Henry Alvord Scott was born on February 25, 1898 in Alamance County, North Carolina.


He was the ninth child born to Robert W. Scott and his wife Elizabeth Hughes Scott, who owned and managed the prosperous and successful Melville Farm.



MELVILLE FARM, ALAMANCE COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA

Henry's parents, Robert and Elizabeth, known as Lizzie, raised stock such as horses, sheep, cows, and pigs, and grew grains, vegetables, and fruits.

Lizzie often managed the day-to-day operation of Melville Farm freeing Robert to expend his considerable energies on his church, Alamance County, and the State of North Carolina.



A MEMORABLE TRIP

- Henry was named for his father's friend and mentor, Henry Elijah Alvord.
- Robert met Henry Alvord during the winter of 1882 when he left home to spend several months at Houghton Farm near Mountainville, New York.
- Mr.Alvord was the director of the experimental agricultural station at Houghton Farm. He was impressed with Robert's ambition and agreed to help him learn new farming techniques.
- Mr. Alvord mentored Robert and they remained in contact after Robert returned home to North Carolina.
- Robert instilled his knowledge and desire in his children and their farms prospered as a result.

Henry and his many siblings grew up in this house which was built by his grandfather, Henderson Scott. The family hosted numerous teachers as well, so there was always a lot of activity.

THE JERSEY COW

• One secret to Melville Farm's success was Robert's herd of Jersey cows. Jersey cows produce milk that contains very high butterfat. Robert learned about dairy farming while at Houghton Farm.

• Many people are familiar with Houghton Farm today as it was featured in the work of the artist Winslow Homer. Mr. Homer was in residence a few years before Robert's visit.

• Mr. Homer painted rural scenes and the Jersey cow was often featured in his work such as "The Milk Maid" pictured here.


THE UNC YEARS (1915-1919)

THE UNC YEARS (1915-1919)


Students remained in class but were organized into Companies. Each Company held training and drills to prepare the student-soldiers for war.

The SATC program was short-lived, running from October to December in the fall of 1918 as the war ended in November.

The campus did not return to normal, however.


The Spanish Influenza epidemic erupted on campus and claimed seven lives.



THE UNC YEARS (1915-1919)


The UNC campus was saddened by the loss of President Edward Kidder Graham who died of pneumonia in October of 1918.

Dean Marvin H. Stacy, who stepped in to lead the faculty also succumbed to the flu several months later.



Edward Kidder Graham (1876-1918)



DUE TO THE EPIDEMIC, HENRY WAS UNABLE TO ATTEND THE FUNERAL.







During construction, an unexpected snowstorm delayed the work for a while. The first few gallons of Melville Dairy milk were bottled on August 1, 1927.


Before electricity was available, the milk was kept cold through the use of a gasoline powered generator.

Henry handled the management of the herd, Ralph handled bottling and delivery, and Ralph's wife Hazeleene was the accountant.


HOME OF HENRY AND MARGARET AND THEIR CHILDREN

Henry's daughter, Nancy Scott Fuller, remembers her father as a devoted family man.


Despite his busy schedule, the family always took their meals together. Margaret was a wonderful cook!

Throughout his life Henry was an active member of the Hawfields Presbyterian Church. On November 6, 1932 he became an elder and served as clerk of the session for many years. In 1957 he represented Orange Presbytery at the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Birmingham, Alabama.



HAWFIELDS PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH CEMETERY

As part of his service to his church, Henry was particularly interested in the upkeep and beautification of Hawfields Presbyterian Church Cemetery.

Years earlier, Henry's father Robert piloted the formation of the Hawfields Memorial Association and was a Trustee, driving around to visit parishioners in his horse and buggy.

In the school year 1948-1949 he was President of the State Boards of Education Association.




NORTH CAROLINA A&T UNIVERSITY

Henry was appointed to the Board of Trustees of North Carolina Agricultural & Technical College (now University) in 1943 by Governor Broughton.

He was re-appointed by succeeding governors until 1962 and was a member of the Fulbright Scholarship committee of that Institution.


Pictured here is the Dudley Memorial Building which at one time housed the President's Office and many other administrative offices.

The building was located in downtown Graham, the County Seat. Pictured here is the historic courthouse which is still in use.




ALAMANCE GENERAL HOSPITAL

For many years Henry Scott was a trustee of Alamance General Hospital.

Alamance General Hospital started out as Rainey Hospital. The hospital was sold to Dr. George Carrington and Dr. Ralph Brooks who changed the name to Alamance General Hospital.

Alamance General Hospital served until 1961 when it was replaced by Memorial Hospital of Alamance in West Burlington.
