





Our story begins in 1883 with the marriage of Robert W. Scott and Elizabeth "Lizzie" Hughes.

Robert and Lizzie took over his family farm located in the Hawfields section of Alamance County, North Carolina, south of modern day Mebane.

Over the next three decades they would create several successful businesses, including the **Alamance Stock Farm** and **Melville Farm**.





Robert and Lizzie Scott moved into this farmhouse after their wedding. They would live there for the rest of their lives. The house was built in the 1850s by Robert's father, Henderson Scott. The house, located south of Mebane, NC, still stands today.

The summer of 1911 was a busy time for the Scott family.


- June saw the wedding of their first child, Josephine Scott, to Cassius Rex Hudson.
- In July, Robert and Lizzie hosted the annual picnic for Hawfields Presbyterian Church.
- In August, Lizzie gave birth to their fourteenth child, a little boy they named Anderson Hughes Scott, "Jim" for short. Jim is pictured to the right.



Robert's happy life was upended when Lizzie died in 1914.


He sent the younger children to stay with relatives until his sister, Mamie White Scott, an unmarried schoolteacher could move home to care for them.

In 1915 Robert married Ella Anderson, a family friend and teacher. All of the children loved and respected "Miss Ella."




As did many of his siblings, Jim attended the Hawfields Public School.

- Before public schools were available, the Scott family had to hire tutors or send their children to private schools.
- The Hawfields Public School was made possible by a special tax which passed narrowly in 1903.
- Jim's father, Robert W. Scott, actively promoted the legislation that made the school possible.
- The vote on the tax was expected to be so close that Governor Aycock traveled from Raleigh to encourage its success.




Jim attended the Alexander Wilson High School as did his future wife, Josephine Kimrey, and her sister Pearle Kimrey.

- Jo's sister Pearle: first row, first from left




Jim and his Aunt Mamie at High School Graduation

Jim's Aunt Mamie, pictured here with him at graduation, was an enduring presence in his life until she passed away in 1953. She gave up her teaching career to help her brother Robert raise his younger children.




After one year at UNC, Jim enrolled at the North Carolina College of Agriculture and Engineering, now NC State. He worked hard and caught up to the other students, who were better prepared than he was for college.



Jim majored in Dairy Manufacturing

- His college yearbook, The Agromeck, describes Anderson Hughes Scott as being from Haw River, N. C. and majoring in Dairy Manufacturing. He graduated in 1933.
- His nicknames included:
- "Jim", "A. H.", "H. A.", and "Scottie"

He was a member of R. O. T. C., the Agriculture Club, the Poultry Club, and the Student Council



While Jim was still in high school, two of his brother, Ralph H. Scott and Henry A. Scott, started Melville Dairy on Henry's farm.

Melville Dairy began production on Henry's farm in 1927.

By 1935, the dairy had moved into a state-of-the-art processing plant in downtown Burlington, NC.

Jim became plant manager and a partner in Melville Dairy.

His knowledge of dairy manufacturing was a great asset to the business.

Smith-Melville Dairy

Melville Dairy of Burlington purchased Smith Dairy owned by Lewis M. and Margaret Scott Smith of Raleigh in 1948. The Smith-Melville Dairy operated at the original Smith Farm until it was relocated to a new distribution plant on the west side of Raleigh.

Jim moved his family to Raleigh and became manager of of the Smith-Melville Dairy. This dairy was sold in 1953 to Longmeadow Dairies of Durham.

Jim and his family moved back to Haw River after Smith-Melville Dairy was sold.



Jim had many family connections in Raleigh during his years with Smith-Melville Dairy.

Jim's older brother W. Kerr Scott was the Governor of North Carolina from January of 1949 to January of 1953. Another brother, Ralph Scott, was a NC state senator from 1951 to 1980. Sisters Josephine and Margaret both lived in Raleigh at this time.

Western Boulevard Presbyterian Church, Raleigh, NC

After moving to Raleigh, Jim and Jo became members of a new church, Western Boulevard Presbyterian Church.

The church was started in the late 1940s and moved to its permanent location a few years later.

Jim served as a deacon and Jo was the organist until they returned home to Haw River.



After returning home, Jim took on a big responsibility spearheading the effort to create a new Educational Building at Hawfields Presbyterian Church.

In appreciation for this long commitment as Chairman of the Building Committee for the new Educational Building the church presented him with a golden key appropriately framed with a plaque on December 5, 1965.



Jo resumed her role as organist and choir director at Hawfields Presbyterian Church.

Jo would stay in this role for a total of 25 years.

In addition to her work at the church, Jo taught music. The school bus would drop her students off after school. The youngsters would sit in the living room waiting for their turn at the piano.

Alamance Frozen Food Locker, Inc., Burlington, NC

Alamance Frozen Foods was started by Floyd and Ralph Scott in the late 1940s.

This frozen food locker rented space for both commercial and private use.

Jim purchased the business in the mid-1950s after Smith-Melville Dairy was sold to Longmeadow Dairy.

Jim expanded the business particularly in the area of hickory smoked ham and bacon. He owned and managed this business for 15 years.


Charles Scott was enrolled in medical school at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill when he married Sandra Kay Smith, a teacher.

He would graduate two years later and begin several residencies in pediatric medicine.



Martha graduated from Vardell Preparatory School


Martha Elizabeth Scott was married to Stephen Randolph Madden in a ceremony at Hawfields Presbyterian Church.



After the food locker business was sold, Jim became an Inspector and then a Sanitarian for Alamance County

• Jim's knowledge of food storage and safety helped him in his next career choice.

He enrolled in a course at UNC School of Public Health to help him prepare for his new assignment. Jim retired from public health after 10 years of active service to Alamance County.



Jim Scott was the Commodity Supervisor of the Federal Surplus Food Distribution program for Alamance County for many years in the 1970s.

The project involved managing the storage and distribution of surplus food to welfare recipients.




"Mr. Jim"

Scotts Give Family Bible


- On July 28, 1982, Jim, his son Dr. Charles and his grandson Andy presented a family Bible to Washington & Lee University.
